



## State Level RFI Tracking – Rural Health Transformation Fund

**Background:** The Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP), as part of the One Big Beautiful Bill Act that was enacted into law on July 4, 2025, created a \$50 billion fund to strengthen health care across rural America. The \$50 billion will be distributed to all states between fiscal years (FYs) 2026 – 2030 with \$10 billion being distributed each fiscal year. Half of the \$50 billion will be allocated equally among all states with an application approved by CMS. The other 50% of funds will be distributed to states with an approved application in an amount determined by the CMS Administrator.

States are the only eligible applicants. D.C. and territories are not eligible. The primary recipient of each award must be a single state. Local governments, hospitals, universities, nonprofits, federally recognized tribes, individuals, and any other entity besides a state are ineligible to receive an RHT Program award. For application purposes, governors may designate a lead agency or office to develop and submit the application, such as the state department of health or state Medicaid agency. The application must include a letter of endorsement signed by the governor. The governor-designated lead agency or office that submitted the application will be awarded funding and is the prime awardee responsible to CMS.

**State Response:** In state solicitations for comment, Governors and Departments designated by Governors are looking to inform their application to CMS. Below is a tracking update of where states are in the process of developing their respective applications for the RHTF and a series of resources NRHA has developed.
